EXISTING EDUCATIONAL AND PUBLIC AWARENESS INITIATIVES

- The <u>Clothesline Project</u>: A project that has those affected by various types of violence decorate a shirt and hang it on a public clothesline as a testimony to the problem of violence against women.
- The <u>Domestic Violence Awareness Project</u>: This project supports national and local advocacy groups by offering campaign ideas, strategies, materials, and resources related to raising public awareness.
- NO MORE: A public awareness campaign that aims to raise awareness around ending domestic violence and sexual assault as well as engage bystander intervention. The campaign's goal is to destigmatize the conversation surrounding domestic violence and sexual assault while taking action to prevent and altogether end it.

- The <u>National Domestic Violence Hotline</u> has highlytrained advocates available 24/7 to talk confidentially with anyone experiencing domestic violence, seeking resources or information, or questioning unhealthy aspects of their relationship: 1-800-799-SAFE (7233) or <u>chat online</u>.
- The National Sexual Assault Hotline operated by <u>RAINN</u> connects the caller with a trained staff member from a local sexual assault service provider: 1-800-656-HOPE (4673). RAINN also operates a 24/7 <u>National Sexual Assault Online Hotline</u> where sexual assault survivors and their friends and families can get help through live chat.
- The National Coalition Against Domestic
 <u>Violence</u> has a list of National Crisis
 Organizations that offer assistance to specialized
 groups such as children, teens, differently abled,
 women of color, Latina/Latino, immigrants,
 indigenous women, Asian/Pacific Islander,
 African-American, LGBT, elders, and men.
- Loveisrespect, Break the Cycle, and the National Domestic Violence Hotline partnered to create a hotline that is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Those experiencing abusive behaviors can call 1-866-331-9474, chat online, or text "loveis" to 22522 to speak with a trained peer advocate.
